

Understanding the Russo-Ukraine War: A Social Studies Perspective

Objective:

- To comprehend the historical, geopolitical, and humanitarian dimensions of the Ukrainian conflict.
- To analyze the impact of the conflict on Ukraine and its neighboring countries.
- To evaluate the role of international organizations and diplomatic efforts in resolving the crisis.

Materials Needed:

- Maps of Ukraine and its neighboring countries

Lesson Outline:

- Discuss the concept of sovereignty and the implications of foreign intervention in the internal affairs of a sovereign state.

- Explore with your students of other cases where propaganda was used.

Assessment:

- Students can write a summary that identifies the propaganda technique, how it's used in this case and how it contradicts factual information.
